Curriculum Vision | Psychology

The purpose of the Psychology curriculum is to ensure that all students are provided with the opportunity to access the AQA syllabus. Different styles of teaching are used to develop students understanding and enjoyment of the subject. Students are offered lots of opportunities to share their ideas with the rest of the class, developing confidence, language skills and critical thinking.

The Year 12/13 Psychology curriculum will support students in developing an understanding of psychological issues. It will highlight 'real world' applications. These skills will enable students to become more confident in their understanding of reasons behind behaviours and physiological/mental functioning.

- develop a lifelong interest in psychological research.
