Marianne Highwood has agreed to continue for a second term, for which we are really grateful as Marianne brings tremendous experience in Higher Education. They bring different skills and experiences and we look forward to working with them both.

The Governors School Lunch project has continued, and four sessions have now taken place across year 7-8 and 11-13. The project has also helped with the aim of raising Governors' profile within the school and has given students the opportunity, in some cases for the first time, to interact directly with Governors.
