Summer Uniform



In the summer, when temperatures can be consistently high; summer uniform will operate. This means that blazers do not have to be worn and shorts can be worn. However, if a student is not warm enough, it is their blazer that should be worn. It cannot be replaced by other items such as hoodies, jumpers or coats. If particularly cold, a school jumper can still be worn under the blazer. **Summer uniform commences at the start of Term 6.**

If it is particularly hot prior to term 6, Summer Uniform may commence early. This would be communicated to all staff, students and parents. In the event of really extreme temperatures, the uniform may be relaxed even further, with the removal of ties and potentially students attending in PE kit. This would be announced, as and when needed.

Exceptions

Exceptions to the uniform policy may be granted for reasons of religious observance. This would only be permitted following discussions between parents and the relevant Head of Year.

- The vast majority of our students are well behaved and are enthusiastic about their learning.
- We have high expectations of our students and our behaviour policy reflects this.
- Pupils are helped to take responsibility for their actions.
- Families are involved in behaviour incidents to foster good relationships between the school and pupils' home life. When a student receives a sanction/detention the parent will be informed via an email about the details of why that young person has a detention.
 - Following a trial in Term 6 last year we have now incorporated automatic centralised L1 detentions within 24 Hours of the incident happening.
