What is a predicted grade at GCSE?

A projected grade is a professional judgement, considering a student's current attainment, rate of progress and engagement with class and homework. It will be drawn from a combination of assessed pieces of work, coursework (NEA) and Pre-Public Exams, as well as from observations of their engagement in class and other elements of work and homework. It is not a target - It is a professional judgement of the grade the student is likely to achieve if they continue to work as they have been since the previous assessment.
