- There is a certificated rewards system for this, like other extra-curricular activities have.






THE NORTON KNATCHBULL SCHOOL My child is already very busy...

Why is whole school Literacy Important?

- Literacy is the ability to read, write, speak and listen in a way that lets us communicate effectively and make sense of the world





Assessment

- Each term your son will have one piece of work fully marked with development comments from their teacher
- Your son will have a grade of Working towards expected / Meeting expected / Exceeding expected
- This grade will refer to that specific piece of work not their overall performance in class
- This will usually coincide with the end of a theme or topic
 Some departments may additionally mark other work or make
- Some departments may addition notes/stamp homework.
- Your son will also have continuous feedback from their teachers, verbally in lesson





THE NORTON KNATCHBULL SCHOOL Monitoring

- The week before half term you will get the first set of Monitoring grades for your son
- This will give you an accurate guide as to how your son is settling in across all subjects
- It will provide an Attitude to Learning Score for each subject.
- For each subject you will receive:
 1-3 Attitude To Learning Grade (1 is Outstanding, 2 is Good, 3 is Requires Improvement).

- For the next 2 monitoring reports (January and June) you will receive a full monitoring report
- This will be more in depth than the one from October.
- For each subject you will receive: **1. 1-3 HWK Grade** (1 is Outstanding, 2 is Good, 3 is Requires
- Improvement).
- 2. 1-3 Attitude To Learning Grade (1 is Outstanding, 2 is Good, 3 is Requires Improvement).
- **3.** Working towards Expected / Meeting Expected / Exceeding Expected (this is for their overall class contribution rather than just their last assessment grade).

THE NORTON KNATCHBULL SCHOOL Behaviour Policy

- Firm but fair policy
- 3 strikes in a lesson leads to class detention (L1)
- This is an email home to yourselves that explains what has gone wrong
- 3 class detentions, in a subject, leads to an afterschool detention and a Subject Report (L2)
- This will mean your son has to remain at school for an hour in detention you will be informed of the arrangements via an email.
- **Points based behaviour system** accumulation leads to Student Support Manager report (orange) and Senior Leadership (red) report
- Each detention is 1 points
- Each after school detention is 2 points
- SSM Report when 10 points
- HOY report when 20 points are reached
- SLT Report when 30 points are reached





THE NORTON KNATCHBULL SCHOOL Academic Support - Report

- This is an additional Blue Report
- It is a Non Punitive Report
- For those who need extra help or guidance. It is a supportive tool not a punishment.
- Reports directly to HOY/SSM every day
- If your son is on this then I will email you and explain the reasons, but also the targets that your son has come up with to get himself back on track
- Proven to help get the boys back on track before the need for an SSM or SLT report

THE NORTON KNATCHBULL SCHOOL SatchelOne

- All work should be completed to your son's best ability at all times
- You can track this on SatchelOne (you should have a login for this if not please contact Mrs Parsonage. They were sent home with your son in the past week)
- Ensure that you are signed up to receive alerts from SatchelOne – this can be configured to send you a text or email if your son fails to hand in a piece of work
- It will also let you structure free time based on the tasks left to complete
- Quantity of Homework greatly increases in Y9 when GCSE's begin so your son will need to be organised and structured by this point.
- Homework club 3:20-4:30 free to use and will be starting later this term for all year groups
